# The Impact of Implicit Bias on Reporting Child Neglect

Disproportionality in reporting child neglect is well documented and impacts minority families the greatest. According to the American Academy of Pediatrics, Black children are reported as victims of child abuse or neglect at approximately twice the rate of white children in the United States. Following a three-year study in Pennsylvania, the Pennsylvania Department of Human Services (DHS) published a report in 2021 regarding racial inequities within Pennsylvania's welfare

and public assistance programs, including but not limited to the child welfare system, judicial system, and job placement programs.

The study found that many Pennsylvania residents face marginalization due to a combination of factors: race, gender, poverty, disabilities, and sexual orientation.

The study also revealed the disproportionate impact of systemic racism and marginalization on Black children in Pennsylvania's child welfare system. It found that Black children make up 35 percent of the foster care population and represent 21 percent of potential child abuse victims in child protective service reports. These numbers are striking, considering Black children account for only 13 percent of the total child population of Pennsylvania.

#### **ROLE OF IMPLICIT BIAS**

This disproportionality is largely due to implicit bias — an unconscious association, belief or attitude toward a social group. Some of the implicit biases that can impact what does and does not get reported include poverty, racial, age, and gender biases. Racial biases, for example, can result in both underreporting white children and overreporting Black children for neglect.

Attribution biases also play a role. For example, people may perceive situations involving a family who looks like them more positively and therefore not suspect abuse and/or neglect. The opposite happens too — people may interpret situations more negatively and assume the worst when the family looks different from them and thus be quicker to suspect abuse and/or neglect.

#### WHAT CAN BE DONE?

We must work together to identify examples of implicit biases — both institutional and personal — and find ways to address them so real, positive change can happen.

Real change begins with each of us examining ourselves and addressing our own personal biases. A great place to start understanding your own implicit biases is taking the Implicit Association Tests available through **Project Implicit**.



PFSA has also launched a training for mandated reporters on the topic of neglect, which includes a section on how to identify and consider implicit biases more deeply when deciding when to make a report of child neglect.



# Families in Recovery New Facilitator Training

This research-based program is a great resource for parents, guardians, and caretakers recovering from substance use disorder. The program aims to teach healthy coping and parenting skills while balancing the needs of recovery.

New facilitators of the Families in Recovery (FiR) program will be fully prepared to implement the program and provide training after attending a two-day comprehensive session consisting of content, education, and application instruction of the curriculum. FiR facilitators come together to share program implementation experience, ideas, and insights following initial training.

All organizations interested in implementing the Families in Recovery program are required to enter an agreement contract with PFSA and participate in the evaluation requirements of the program. FiR contracts include ongoing technical assistance, program development, facilitator calls, and assistance with data collection procedures.
