Choosing a Quality Child Care Program

Selecting a child care program for your child(ren) is an important yet often very difficult decision.

Not all child care programs are the same — and unfortunately, abuse and neglect do happen sometimes while children are in care. Your child will spend a lot of time at this location, so you want to ensure it is a safe environment, free from abuse and neglect. It should also be an environment where your child can grow and thrive — helping your child develop good relationships and skills that prepare them for school by age 5. You should also feel comfortable with the staff and feel that your concerns are heard, and communication about your child goes both ways between you and the staff.

Selecting such a child care option can feel like a daunting task. Here are some tips and questions to ask when looking at child care options.

Ensure the child care is licensed by the

state. Whether it is an in-home daycare or a daycare facility, a licensed child care program meets the basic requirements to be open as a provider. This means, at minimum, the staff have their clearances, the physical space is deemed safe, the facility follows staffing requirements to ensure there are enough staff supervising and caring for the children present,

and regular inspections occur to ensure compliance.

Search for child care and early learning programs near you and find out about each facility's certification history (to include any licensing violations current or past) by visiting COMPASS HHS Provider Search Home (state.pa.us).

Talk to other parents who have children at the child care center. Obtaining and following up on references for the child care program you are interested in can give you good insight into the experiences of other families.

Visit the child care center. Visiting the location and speaking with the director and staff is a helpful step in making a connection and deciding if the environment is right for you and your child. Do you feel comfortable there? Do other children appear happy and cared for? Do children appear to be learning? Do the staff seem knowledgeable and engaged with the children?

In Pennsylvania, quality providers participate in an accrediting program called Keystone STARS — the rating tells you where they are in that accrediting program. The more stars a provider has, the closer their program aligns with the accrediting requirements.

Questions to ask potential centers to help you select the best option for you and your child(ren):

- What hours and days are you open?
- How much does it cost?
- Do you provide meals (breakfast, lunch, dinner, snacks)?
- What age groups do you serve?
- Are there openings for my child's age group?
- Can I come visit with my child?

- Can I visit my child anytime?
- How do you handle discipline?
- Where do the children sleep? If you have an infant — do you ensure that babies sleep on their backs?
- Are you licensed?
- Do you participate in the Keystone STARS program?

When making the decision, ask yourself:

- Which child care should I choose so that my child will be happy and grow?
- Which caregiver can meet any special accommodations for my child?
- Are the caregiver's values compatible with my family's values?
- Is the child care available and affordable according to my family's needs and resources?
- Do I feel good about my decision?

Selecting a child care provider that is safe and a good fit for your family is well worth the time and effort.

Additional Resources

In Pennsylvania, the **Early Learning Resource Centers (ELRCs)** are your hub for child care information. They are available to answer your child care questions and assist you (if needed) in getting set up with the **Child Care Works** program for subsidized child care.

UPCOMING PFSA TRAININGS

Families in Recovery New Facilitator Training

This research-based program is a great resource for parents, guardians, and caretakers recovering from substance use disorder. The program aims to teach healthy coping and parenting skills while balancing the needs of recovery.

New facilitators of the Families in Recovery (FiR) program will be fully prepared to implement the program and provide training after attending a two-day comprehensive session consisting of content, education, and application instruction of the curriculum. FiR facilitators come together to share program implementation experience, ideas, and insights following initial training.

All organizations interested in implementing the Families in Recovery program are required to enter an agreement contract with PFSA and participate in the evaluation requirements of the program. FiR contracts include ongoing technical assistance, program development, facilitator calls, and assistance with data collection procedures.


